

100 Best Minnesota High School Small Forwards

In the early days, the forwards were the designated shooters, working the baseline, looking for a pass from the high post for an easy “pot shot” underneath the basket. They were probably the best athletes on their teams, but not the biggest. Big kids at that time (pre-1930s) were more likely to play the guard spot, where they were defensive specialists. They guarded people.

The forward came to share the scoring load with the center after the advent of the low post in the 1940s, and after the 1950s one of the forwards came to be a second post on the floor, if in fact one had a pair of “bigs” to deploy in that way. The strong side forward continued to be a key scorer for most teams.

Today, the small forward, or shooting or scoring forward (or, simply, the “3”), is pretty much interchangeable with the big guard or shooting guard (the “2”). Both handle the ball almost like a point guard, put the ball on the floor and get to the rim, and they can shoot it. They have to be able to shoot it.
