## State Tournament Scoring Records

Nobody thought much about the state tournament career record for individual scoring until, oh, about 2006. The record at the time, though nobody seemed to be much aware of it, was the 238 points scored by Khalid El-Amin in 1995, 1996 and 1997. So, here we were, with the Class AA final game winding down to its final minutes. Isaiah Dahlman had led the Braham Bombers to the 2004 and 2005 Class AA titles, becoming the fifth boy to lead all tournament scorers in two tournaments for a total of 163 points, or about 27 points per game. He needed 73 points to tie El-Amin's record, and 74 to break it. He scored 36 points in the first round, then just 20 in the semis. Now, he needed 17 more points to tie El-Amin, 18 for the record. Late in the final game against Breck, Dahlman had scored a hard-earned 15 points and Braham was up by eight points as the clock ticked down toward one minute. And, Braham coach Bob Vaughan took Dahlman out of the game to a great ovation by the crowd at the Target Center, having no idea that three more points would have made him the tournament's all-time leading scorer.

Well, shame on me. I knew that Dahlman was two points short of El-Amin's record. But, nobody had ever cared about that particular record, and so I hadn't really said anything. Until now. Now, I mentioned Dahlman's close call to my basketball geek friends, one of whom, Matt Pederson, runs a Web site devoted to Minnesota high school basketball records. He posted my list, which at the time included El-Amin, then Dahlman, then Mark Olberding, and others. Two years later, Cody Schilling broke El-Amin's record and thanks to Matt and his Web site, everybody knew about it.

Matt also publishes a little booklet that he distributes to media and friends each year at the state tournament. His most recent version includes his list of the state tournament's 14 top career scorers, each of whom has scored 180 points or more. At the bottom of the list, he says, "The scoring record progressed from McIntyre to Ron Johnson to Olberding to El-Amin to Schilling."

But, wait! Who held the record before Jim McIntyre? I'm glad you asked!

| 1913 | Peter Guenther, Mountain Lake | 71 | 17.75 |

Guenther, a forward, scored a record 27 points in the first state tournament game ever played, a 42-9 Mountain Lake win over Blue Earth, a record that stood until Jim McIntyre scored 29 in his first game in 1944. We know that he scored 71 points in the tournament because the MSHSL says so. We don't know how they know that because, as far as we know, no box scores are in existence for two of the Lakers four games. All that aside, his 71 points and his 17.75 ppg both stood for 10 years. His career scoring record of 71 points, well, it only stood for two years when it was broken by a teammate on that 1913 Mountain Lake team.

| 1915 | Gerhard "Shorty" Hiebert, Mountain <br> Lake | 88 (and almost <br> surely a few more) | 12.6 |

Hiebert is best known for being the only boy in the history of the state tournament to have scored all of his team's points in a game. That came in the 1915 state final, in which Red Wing defeated Mountain Lake 30-18 as Heibert scored all 18 points. He scored 66 points in 4 games that year, and he also scored 10 points in the Laker's only state tournament game of 1914, a 19-18 loss to Fosston, who also had beaten Mountain Lake in the 1913 final.

Then, there was also a forward identified in box scores as Herbert on that 1913 Mountain Lake team. But, in a photo of the 1913 Mountain Lake team, there is no Herbert but there is a George Hiebert, who scored 4 and 8 points in the two games for which box scores exist. And, now, thanks to the Cottonwood County Historical Society, we know that George Hiebert in 1913 and Gerhard "Shorty" Hiebert in 1915 are in fact the same person. Why the name change? Well, why Herbert? Probably because the name Hiebert was unfamiliar to whomever put together the box scores, though it is in fact not an uncommon name among Russian Mennonite immigrants to the upper Midwest (mostly Minnesota and Manitoba). And, the same Anglo-Saxon scorekeeper probably didn't know anybody named Gerhard, but knew plenty of fellows named George. And, so, the rest is history.

In any event, we are pretty sure that Shorty Hiebert scored 88 points in 7 games, and he almost surely scored a few more points in those other two 1913 games. In fact, if he matched his average in the two games for which box scores exist, he would have finished his career with exactly 100 points.

| 1919 | Gordy Malmer, Albert Lea | 83 (but maybe 95) | $13.8(13.6)$ |

OK, now it gets even more complicated. We're pretty sure that Malmer scored 65 points for the state champs from Albert Lea in 1919. The MSHSL says 54, but we've seen the box scores that show Malmer scoring 13, 16, 13 and 23 points in four Albert Lea victories. On the other hand, the Albert Lea Tribune, at the close of the tournament, said he scored 64, but it didn't clarify how it got to that number. There is also a possibility that none of these numbers is correct due to confusion as to whether Gordy or his brother Clarence, who was actually the captain of the team, shot Albert Lea's free throws. This was the era of the "designated free throw shooter," and at least one source-the Carleton campus newspaper, The Carletonia-reported that Clarence shot the free throws in the Fosston game. If that is correct, then Gordy scored 56 or 57 points (still not 54). But all of the sources agree that Gordy shot all of Albert Lea's free throws in the other three games, so it seems most likely that he shot them against Fosston, too. We think he scored 65 points in 1919.

To add to the fun, The Carletonia also shows that Clarence shot Albert Lea's free throws in two of three games the previous year-while no box scores exist for the third game. A total of 14 free throws are up for grabs. But, the Tribune again gives those free throws to Gordy. In short, Gordy may have scored anywhere from a high of 30 points to a low of just 4 points in 1918. For his career, then, the total could be anywhere from 58 to 95 . If we attribute zero points in games where there are no boxscores, which is what we did with Hiebert, his most likely documented number is 83 . If he shot Albert Lea's free throws in al three games in 1918, and if he matched his average for the other two games in the game with the missing box score, then his career total would be 95 . We may never know for sure, and we also may never know for sure whether he scored more or less than Hiebert did. The possibility that they ended up tied is well within the margin of error, so they are both more than deserving of recognition.

Gordie Malmer was born in 1901 and died in 1928. Older brother Clarence was born in 1899 and outlived his younger brother by 54 years.

| 1945 | Jim McIntyre, Minneapolis Patrick Henry | 186 | 31.0 |

Finally, in 1945, and thanks to Jim McIntyre, we could be sure who held the career scoring record and how many points it was. And, it was very nearly double what it had been in 1919 or (still) in 1944. Big Mac broke Guenther's 31-year-old record for most points in a game in his very first time out, with 29 points against Mankato in the first round. He topped that in the 1944 final against Crosby-Ironton with another single game record of 36 . In 1945, he waited until his third game-his second championship final-to break the single-game record again, and his 43 points against Ely, combined with 57 points in his first two games, added up to a nice round 100 points, a figure that has been matched or exceeded only four times in the 74 years since. His 186 career points has been exceeded ten times now (in 2019) but his 31 ppg has been exceeded only four times-by Ron Johnson, Jim Hill, Jimmy Jensen and Mike Johnson.

| 1956 | Ron Johnson, New Prague | 203 | 33.8 |

Johnson scored 94 points in 1955 and a new record of 109 in 1956. McIntyre of course played nothing but championship round games and scored 31 ppg in those six games. Johnson played four championship round games and scored 28.8 ppg in those games. He really made hay in a pair of $3^{\text {rd_ }}$ place games, scoring 40 points in a 70-64 loss to Bemidji, then another new record of 48 in a 77-54 win over Winona. Johnson scored 53 percent of his team's points. Only McIntyre and Breuer ever scored a higher percentage.

| 1974 | Mark Olberding, Melrose | 228 | 22.8 |

Olberding is the fourth big man on this list to score more than 50 percent of his team's points, which he did in the championship year of 1974 (112 out of 217). He had an extra game that year-the overall championship game between the A and AA champs, in which he scored 30 points. But while he did not score as many points as, say, Cody Schilling or Isaiah Dahlman, Olberding scored 52 percent of his teams points, while they scored just 38 and 40 percent in a faster-paced offense. Olberding scored 25 points in 1972 as backup to center Randy Douvier, who was no slouch ( 28 points twice), but exploded for 91 and 112 points in his final two years.

| 1997 | Khalid EI-Amin | 238 | 21.6 |

El-Amin was North's top scorer but he is unique on this list in that that wasn't by design. His role was to get the ball to his teammates. And, so, he had numerous games in which he scored in the teens. But when North needed him to score, as against St. Thomas in 1996, he could explode and did explode in that game for 41 points. In the end, he led his team in scoring in six of eleven games, but that includes the last four games he played with them-the 1996 championship game and all three games in 1997.

| 2008 | Cody Schilling | 267 | 29.7 |

Schilling is the only boy ever to lead the tournament in scoring three times. He scored 30 points or more six times in nine games, and led his team in scoring eight times
